



Foreword

Welcome to Nomos 19! With 478 lots this is a large sale for us and, as usual, there are coins of all types to be found in the catalogue: Celtic (lots 1-16), Greek (17-227), Roman (including Provincial, 228-397), Byzantine (398-453), and coins of the Crusaders, Axum, the Goths, and late Medieval-early Modern Europe (454-478). Obviously, we have coins to tempt every collector – and rightly so! They have estimates ranging from CHF 150 (lot 172, a small Antonine bronze from Pisidian Antioch bearing a noble chicken) all the way to CHF 125 000 (lot 73, an extremely rare gold stater of the Chalkidian League), and with all prices in between – there is really something for everyone!

Of special interest in this sale is the fact that many of the coins come from a single private collection, formed by an erudite German collector over some thirty years: the last coins were acquired around 2011, but he basically ceased by 2005. Named the Trausnitz Collection, it was almost entirely composed of Greek and Roman coins, but with some later issues as well. According to his family the late collector spent what seemed, at least to them, endless hours studying his coins, reading about them, and, in some cases, gently cleaning them. Any clear signs of overly enthusiastic cleaning have been noted in this catalogue.

Here are a few really special items to whet your interest!

Lot 7I (estimated at CHF I 500) is a tetrobol of the Chalkidian League, struck at Olynthos in 42I/420. Now, in general, while Chalkidian League tetrobols are attractive and desirable coins, they are not exactly rare, but this one is. Struck in c. 42I/420 BC, not only is it of splendid style, but it also bears the mint name, Olynth, on the obverse.

The cistophorus was a lightweight tetradrachm (c. 12.00 g) that was introduced by the Attalids in c. 175 BC as the main denomination for their kingdom. This enabled them to exclude Attic weight Seleucid issues, and reserve their own Attic weight issues for foreign trade. Cistophoric tetradrachms continued to be produced until at least the 2nd century AD. Lot 247 (est. CHF 15 000) is a cistophorus of Augustus, struck c. 27 BC at an uncertain Asian mint (probably in Ionia): the portrait it bears is surely one of the most powerful, even dangerous-looking, representations of Augustus ever made. The sphinx on the reverse refers both to the then Octavian's conquest of Egypt (as do the sphinxes on the statue of Augustus from Prima Porta) but also to the sphinx that appeared on the Emperor's signet ring.

The extremely impressive bimetallic medallion of Commodus that appears as lot 280 (est. CHF 75 000) was only recently cleaned; before that it resided, almost illegible from corrosion, for nearly two decades with a private owner. Now we can see a clearly megalomaniacal emperor on the obverse (he is actually holding Jupiter's thunderbolt!), and an astonishing view of Mt. Argaeus in Cappadocia on the reverse. Sol/Commodus appears in a quadriga atop the mountain, flanked by Phosphoros and Hesperos, the Morning and Evening Stars. This is both unique and amazing!

Not unique, but extremely rare and romantically evocative is lot 454 (est. 5 000), a lead seal or bulla of the tragic Robert de Courtenay, fourth Latin emperor of Constantinople. Intriguingly, the seal is bilingual, giving Robert's titles in Greek on the obverse and in Latin on the reverse. Unfortunately his reign was disastrous with military defeats, the capture and mutilation of his wife, and his own death from malaria while staying with the Prince of Achaia, Geoffrey I de Villehardouin.

Do take the time to go through the other 474 lots in this sale, you will be pleased you did!



Occasionally coins change from merely money to being an actual art object: there are many Sicilian silver coins like that. In fact, there are coins like that from all over the Greek world. But, frankly, there are very few Celtiberian coins that can get away with being called an 'art object'. This is the exception that proves the rule! With its immensely thick (4 mm) flan, very dark patina underlying smooth earthen deposits, and with its design peeping through the deposits as if sailing through a fog, this is simply not just a coin anymore. The more you look at it, the more it impresses you. And, yes, that first assumption, that this is a coin that is worth, maybe, CHF 25, really is wrong.

The so-called Muschel Staters produced by the Boii are well-known because of their mysterious types: basically a bulge on the obverse that seems to cover traces of an unknown, original type, and, on the reverse, a Muschel (= a bivalve, like a clam or a mussel) with rays. It is vaguely reminiscent of the 'Regenbogenschüsselchen' struck further west, but there is no real parallel (especially the obverse with the curious remains of a design around the edge of the bulge).



Kleonymos was the adventurer second son of Kleomenes II of Sparta, and was excluded from succession to the throne, replaced by Areus I, because of his vicious character. He then became a mercenary leader helping the Tarentines in their wars against their neighbors until they expelled him. He returned to Sparta and remained a pest to almost everyone until his death sometime after c. 272.

The quality of this coin is quite extraordinary: beautifully struck from fresh dies; extremely well preserved with no disfiguring marks and in solid, undamaged silver. Kroton must have issued millions and millions of these coins. Thus, whenever modern officials talk about how rare and important ancient coins are as a class, they are actually talking about how rare many coins are today as compared to how common they were when they were made. They, of course, don't know this (but the heritage archaeologists who make such a fuss about the antiquity trade know this full well, which is why they never mention it!). In any case, among all the many nomoi/staters of Kroton minted c. 520/515, this piece's appearance is as fresh as the day it was made, unlike virtually all the other examples of this type I have ever seen. As such, this is astoundingly rare.



This elegant little silver coin is actually one of the very rarest of all the coinage of Sicilian Naxos. During the last quarter of the 5th century BC, a number of Sicilian cities issued silver fractions, of which many are the most beautiful and impressive fractions ever struck in the Greek world. This was done out of civic pride and aristocratic rivalry: the coins themselves must have served as a form of donative in the remit of the individual who financed the issue. While the expense of giving out tetradrachms would have been prohibitive for all but the most wealthy, a small coin, albeit one of superlative workmanship, would have been relatively easy to finance.



This is one of the rare pieces with the original name intact.

In some ways this coin is quite mysterious! It may well have been struck from dies, which had been used for a short while but were then withdrawn because some of the design elements were subsequently disapproved. While we often feel that the engravers responsible for ancient coin dies were pretty much free to produce designs that only needed to roughly follow an ordered scheme, thus allowing the engravers a wide degree of latitude, there were limits. The Arethusa heads on the tetradrachm coinage of Syracuse struck during the 480s-460s BC can vary wildly, and include some that are, quite honestly, wildly ugly, they still seem to have circulated freely.

Little is known about Sariakos, other than that he was a king who struck coins and was mentioned in an inscription found in Bulgaria. There are so many tetradrachms of Lysimachos! With their horned portraits of Alexander they were both very popular and exceptionally important commercially. Stylistically they range from the heights of Hellenistic portraiture to curious caricatures, that have actually been turned into disguised portraits of Mithridates VI! What we have here is, without question, one of the best of all the Alexander heads to appear on the coin of Lysimachos. The emotional intensity – pathos – that radiates from this head is a triumph of engraving skill.



This coin is quite annoying! Its only publication is its previous auction appearance, but that is mostly unhelpful: for example, it was given the impossible date of the mid 5th century – that is out of the question stylistically. No mention was made of the possible trace of letters on the reverse, nor was the curious weight standard taken into account. In addition, while Roma, and we, attribute this to northern Greece, all the references cited by Roma place the coin in Asia Minor (huh?). Yet since it does resemble some issues from Uranopolis, Oitaioi and Pherai a northern Greek/Balkan mint is by no means impossible. Story has it that it comes from what Silvia Hurter once called "the usual Turks". Thus, we can only speculate as to its exact origins.

This is surely one of the great Greek gold coins of the mid 4th century BC; it also served as a direct prototype for Philip II's immense series of Apollo-head staters. Interesting is that Philip ordered the portrait's design should be changed, replacing the head of Apollo with flowing hair that is shorter and carefully trimmed. Did Philip do this as a way of identifying the Apollo on his coins with his soldiery, equating them and putting his troops under Apollo's protection?

Most of the known examples of this series weigh between 1.20 and 1.30 gr, are struck in debased silver and are considered diobols. The present example, with a weight of 1.79 gr, is nevertheless part of a smaller group struck in fine silver and is considered a triobol or a debased tetrobol on the Thraco-Macedonian standard. Is it the purity of the alloy that determines the denomination, or is it always the same denomination but does the fineness indicate different periods of minting?

This issue, struck in Kolophon and in Magnesia from a single obverse die that was used by both mints, was produced during the short reign of Philip III Arrhidaios and is one of the most exciting of all the posthumous staters in the name of Philip II. The head on this coin is clearly that of a real person, not just an ideal version of Apollo. The features are so distinctive, in fact, that it has been identified as a true portrait of Alexander III. Why this should have happened and when and where it did is unknown, but the coin's beauty and importance has made it one of the most desirable of all the gold staters of Philip.



The city of Damastion was located somewhere in what is now present day Serbia and was inhabited by people of Illyrian/Dardanian origin; though there were Greek settlers there as well, at least from the 5th century on. The city's importance lay in its silver mines, the location of which are as yet unknown, as is the site of the city itself. The coinage, with obverses modeled on those of the Chalkidian League, was designed as a way of exporting the city's mineral riches. The coins themselves are often very attractive, though there are some that are of rather poor style and many are badly struck; they are generally very rare today, probably because they were viewed primarily as bullion and melted down in antiquity.

It is usually assumed that the later issues of Aegina, from the 5th century on into the 4th, bear a tortoise rather than a sea turtle because of her loss of any pretension of sea power due to her defeat by Athens. This seems rather illogical, however, since states do not usually commemorate their defeat on their own coinage! On the contrary, this change almost certainly has to do with changes in religious ritual.





This electrum third stater comes from the first series of coins ever to bear a personal name – here that of an otherwise unknown Phanes. The stag was the totem animal of Artemis, the great goddess of Ephesos: whether Phanes was an actual official of the sanctuary, or just a prominent merchant or banker who was responsible for the coins and who, out of piety, honored the goddess by using her familiar animal as the type, is unknown.

The Hellenistic gold coinage of Ephesos is uniformly very rare; the sole publication on them is by G. K. Jenkins and appears in Anadolu 21 (1978-1980 – the Festschrift for E. Akurgal – published in 1987 and notoriously obscure). It had been previously thought that all the staters were struck during the Mithradatic wars but this is clearly not the case.

While silver stephanephoroi are known to be struck by an individual bearing the same name as the magistrate we have here, they were minted c. 150-140, and were probably produced by our magistrate's grandfather (a neokoros of the temple of Artemis Leukophryene is known from an inscription of 112/111 BC and is probably to be identified with our magistrate). The depiction on the reverse almost certainly must be connected to a victory in the games held in honor of Artemis, but we know too little of the history of Magnesia in this period to be sure.

It has been suggested that the head on the obverse is that of a calf rather than a seal, but if the large globule that appears to be between the creature's jaws is actually meant to be a ball (rather than just being a misplaced nose), a seal might be more likely. In fact, it could hint at the existence of a tame seal that served as the city's mascot and might be prevailed upon to do tricks at appropriate times.

Until now, this series has been dated to between 479 and 460 BC, primarily because of the particularly late-Archaic-looking head of Athena on the reverse. The present coin requires to revise that chronology since it is definitely overstruck on a stater of Aspendos, dated independently to c. 465-430! On the coin's obverse the undertype is that of a helmeted warrior striding to left, holding a spear and shield (traces of the warrior's body are visible on the pomegranate when the coin is inverted); on the reverse are traces of the undertype of a triskeles in an incuse square (one leg is visible on the cheek of Athena). If we accept that the earlier and cruder types of the Aspendian series with the warrior and the triskeles have to be dated to c. 465-440, the coin of Side we have here, which is stylistically very close to all the other known examples of this early type, cannot be dated before 460 BC. Thus we can suggest that this series ought to be dated to 460-450 BC; thus, we have to downdate the beginning of the next period of the coinage of Side.

The obverse of this coin depicts Herakles preparing to kill Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons. One of the labors of Herakles was to get the famous Belt of Hippolyta, which had been given to her by Ares. When he arrived she was most impressed by him and decided to give him the belt; this was not to the liking of Hera, who wished to foil Herakles, and, stirring up trouble, caused the Amazons to attack. As a result, feeling betrayed, Herakles killed Hippolyta.



Needless to say, this obverse die would have been accompanied by a punch die, which, during the minting process, would have been held by a moneyer who had positioned the punch over a silver flan that had been placed on the obverse die. Then, a second man, using a sledge hammer, would have smashed down the reverse die, thus making the coin. Persian king, wearing radiate tiara, in the running/ kneeling position to left, holding a dagger in his right hand and a bow in his left, and with a quiver over his shoulder; the whole engraved in incuse. For the coin type, see Carradice Type IV A and pl. XIII, 33; and BMC Arabia pl. XXVII, 7. For one of many sigloi with this type of obverse, see CNG e 306, 2013, 195. Basically about as made.

The wide margins around the engraved area of this die meant that the coins struck from it would have had perfectly flat fields around the type. What is particularly intriguing about this piece is that it shows no real signs of use; as if it had been made, perhaps to replace an existing die that had become worn, or as a reserve, but had not been used to mint actual coins. Thus, while it could be an official die, it could also be a die made by a contemporary forger; if worse comes to worst, it could even have been made much more recently (cf. Gitler, et.al., A Group of False Roman Coin Dies, SNR 78, 1999, pp. 101-115, especially p. 106, 16). To be sure, to us the die's appearance and corrosion argues for its genuineness, but its unused state has to be noted and explained. In fact, we can explain this apparent anomaly from the condition of a number of archaeologically excavated dies from Egypt, especially those recently found at Herakleion (see: A. Meadows, Athenian coin dies from Egypt: the new discovery at Herakleion: RBN 157, 2011, pp. 97-117). The Herakleion die (a cube of bronze engraved with three obverses for Athenian tetradrachms, aligned so that each was opposite a flat area, thus ensuring that when one die was in use neither of the other two would be damaged. What is important is that this die cube, while indubitably genuine, shows no real signs of use. But whether this was an official die, or one made by a contemporary forger, or counterfeiter – like those from Egypt, is unclear.

The gold darics and silver sigloi of the Persians were almost all produced in Asia Minor as money for the coin using population of the areas bordering the eastern Mediterranean. While some certainly did travel to the Persian heartland, most were used for interactions with the Greeks. In fact, these coins were so common in Greek use that they were given the nickname, toxótai — archers; they also appear in Greek treasury and donative inscriptions of the 5th and 4th centuries BC.







This is a very strange coin! The obverse, with its tall, thin head of Athena — who has a somewhat up-turned mouth — is vaguely normal, but the reverse owl is quite odd. He has a rather round head, rather than the slightly flattened one we normally see, the wing is long and hangs like a cloak, and the body feathers continue from the head to the tail, without the usual quasi-break two-thirds down. We know that it was found with a large group of normal Athenian tetradrachms dating to no later than the early 420s BC, so it has to be contemporary with them, and not a much later imitation of the 380s or later. Terming it Philisto-Arabian is reasonable and it is certainly 100% ancient, but what it actually is ...

Lucius Staius Murcus came from a family of Marsian origin - perhaps based in Sulmona, east of Rome. He first appears as a legate of Caesar's in 48 BC, during the war against the Pomepeians; by 44 Caesar had appointed him governor of Syria. When Caesar was murdered M joined the assassins, campaigning with success against the Caesarians. He also became a very competent fleet commander: on the same day as the first battle of Philippi, M destroyed the fleet of Domitius Calvinus, who was attempting to bring reinforcements to Antony and Octavian. However, after the final defeat of the Republicans at Philippi, M subsequently, in 41, fled with his fleet to Sextus Pompey in Sicily. Falling prey to internal feuding among Sextus Pompey's officer, M was executed in early 39.

Julia Titi was the only child of the emperor Titus, born to his second wife, Marcia Furnilla in 64. He divorced her the following year but Titus kept custody of Julia. While she was married to a cousin, T. Flavius Sabinus, she nevertheless became the mistress of her father's brother, Domitian. After the death of both her father and her husband, she openly lived with Domitian for a time when his official wife Domitia was out of favor. She died in 91 of what may have been complications following a miscarriage. This coin, issued by her father Titus, shows her as a beautiful girl of seventeen.

This is one of those wonderful coins that show just how much proper cleaning, not tooling (!), can improve a coin's appearance. When this coin appeared on sale in Long Beach and Munich in 2018 it was presented more or less as found, with considerable traces of corrosion and encrustations; it was then cleaned properly. By properly, I do not mean the way so many 1000s of bronze coins have been marred and defaced by cleaners in certain Balkan countries who tool the portraits and legends, smooth the fields and then change the color. The respect and care with which this coin has been treated makes it a prize for any serious collector.



Of the highest rarity, unique. A spectacular and impressive medallion, with an extraordinarily fine bust of Commodus and an especially unusual reverse. With a dark, blackish-green patina. Very professionally cleaned and freed from very heavy deposits; some very minor double-striking, otherwise, about extremely fine.

I would like to very warmly thank Andrew Burnett, Kathrin Siegl and Bernhard Woytek for their kindness in looking at this medallion and giving us their opinion on its highly exciting reverse type: whatever is correct in its description here can be ascribed to them, the mistakes are, as always, my own. It is not uncommon for a hitherto unknown coin to appear on the market: they have been doing so since the Renaissance. But when the portrait *it bears is spectacular, its reverse type is extraordinary, and its inscription is enigmatic, as here,* the coin is truly on another level! That Commodus should be holding Victory on a globe is not surprising, but that he should have the thunderbolt of Jupiter is yet another piece of evidence of his increasing megalomania. The reverse is equally extraordinary, especially for a medallion minted in Rome: why should it have Mt. Argaeus on it? At present we can suggest no answer to that conundrum, but the mountain we see here is remarkably close to the views of Mt. Argaeus that appear on didrachms and drachms of Trajan on the coinage of Caesarea (as RPC 3027-3028, 3046 ff.), so the identification should be correct. Interestingly enough, Phosphoros/Lucifer does appear on another medallion reverse of Commodus: see Gnecchi II, p. 52, 3-4 = pl. 78, 3-4, struck c. 190/191. As for the enigmatic letters TSOF on the reverse, no one has been able to provide a satisfactory explanation, but perhaps it is on the line of *Tempus Saeculorum Omnia Felicia*?

Crispina was the wife of Commodus and came from a consular family. Her father, Gaius Bruttius Praesens, was a distinguished senator and a friend of Marcus Aurelius and they undoubtedly decided that Crispina would be an excellent match for Commodus. Unfortunately, he apparently disliked her and after the conspiracy of Lucilla in 181/2, she was exiled and probably executed (coins in her honor cease to be issued in 182).

Didius Julianus was responsible for one of the most disgraceful scenes in Roman history, when he emerged as the high bidder for the empire after the Praetorians auctioned it off. This action led to such fury that three generals raised the standard of revolt and claimed the empire. Septimius Severus moved fastest and was able to destroy Didius Julianus after little more than 2 months of rule.

This piece is undoubtedly one of the best preserved coins of Cassandreia known: the city is particularly well known for the extremely poor preservation of the majority of its surviving examples. A major reason why so many coins from Cassandreia, its general area, and from other places in modern Greece, are in poor condition is that beginning in the 1960s the widespread use of chemical fertilizers changed the soil's chemical composition, drastically affecting the surfaces of all metal objects found within it. The reverse of this fine coin is spectacular in its way: we see here the cult statue of the god in the famous sanctuary of Zeus Ammon, which was located in what became the territory of the later city of Cassandreia, close to ancient Aphytis on the first leg of the Chalkidiki peninsula (now Kallithea, a cosmopolitan tourist site filled with night clubs where foreign girls with little clothing and less sense meet what are known as Palikari). Cassandreia, founded by Cassander in 316 BC to be his new capital, was on the site of ancient Potidea. Originally the city's sanctuary was dedicated to Dionysos and the Nymphs, but in 403 BC the cult of Zeus Ammon was imported by the Spartan general, Lysander. The sanctuary flourished during the Roman period; Zeus Ammon was the divine patron of Colonia Iulia Augusta Cassandrensis; the name that the colony, first founded by Brutus in 43 BC, was known after its re-foundation by Octavian shortly after Actium. The depiction of Zeus holding a bunch of Dionysos's grapes is particularly interesting, and almost certainly reflects the syncretistic spirit of the age: Zeus Ammon and Dionysos were no longer worshipped separately but as

In Greek myth Lycurgus was king of the Edoni in Thrace and had a violent hatred for Dionysos and his followers, banning them from his kingdom. As a result, the god drove him insane, so much so that he thought his son was actually an ivy plant, and cruelly killed him. As punishment, Dionysos cursed Thrace and the land became barren until the people killed their king by tossing him to the man-eating horses of the area of Mount Pangaion. In any event, when Lycurgus killed his son he also killed one of the nymphs who was with him, Ambrosia: she was then transformed into a grape vine. It should be noted (see Butcher above) that the scene of this myth seems also to have been placed in Syria.



One of the great mysteries of Roman coinage, on a par with the modern American mystery of which concrete elevated highway support conceals Jimmy Hoffa's body, is why a few very curious and mostly obscure Greek cities produced provincial issues in the name of Aemilian and his wife Cornelia Supera. Especially, why were coins struck in Julia; originally known as Ipsos – the scene of the great defeat of Antigonos Monopthalmos in 301 BC – the city's name was changed to Julia under the Julio-Claudians. Prior to striking under Aemilian, the city's last issues were in the second century, under Marcus Aurelius. It is likely, however, that Julia (modern Çayırbağ) was a popular vacation spot for Roman officers, and that Aemilian and Cornelia spent numerous happy holidays there, getting to know the locals and leaving generous tips. Thus, on hearing of their ascension to the throne the Juliotes probably figured they were finally about to cash in! As we know, it didn't quite work out.







Coins were often used as ornaments in Antiquity, as, of course, they continued to be used through the Dark Ages, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance and on into modern times. In fact, many ancient gold coins have some traces of mounting (though these traces are not necessarily noticed today), such as scratches, bangs, holes, or traces of solder. Ignorant modern finders have been known to remove ancient mounts in the belief that doing so increases a coin's value! Many years ago a real idiot brought in an aureus of Tetricus II to Silvia Hurter and me; its only fault was that, curiously, the letters of the legend were pressed flat! The finder then proudly told us that when discovered the coin was in a filigree ring mount, but there were damages so he (the finder) pried it off with a pen-knife and melted it down(!!!) After telling him that the coin would have been worth over CHF 50,000 with the mount, and it was, maybe worth 5,000 without it, she threw him out! This coin is, of course, not an aureus, but it is a very rare coin and the mount is an ancient one, probably from across the Empire's border, in Barbaricum.





Honoria was the older sister of Valentinian III and seems to have attempted to play the important role that other female members of the House of Theodosius managed to obtain for themselves. She must have rightly viewed her brother as a relatively worthless person (true) but her attempt to advance her position by secretly marrying the imperial chamberlain Eugenius only resulted in his execution and her exile. She then sent a letter to Attila the Hun offering herself to him, but this idea failed as well when Attila withdrew his army from Italy in the face of Aëtius and the remonstrations of Pope Leo I. She was then married off to an elderly senator named Herculanus and disappears from history.

Irene was the most powerful and active of all the Byzantine empresses, ruling very effectively for 22 years until she was deposed. She came from a noble Athenian family and in 769 was married to Leo IV, then joint-emperor with his father Constantine V. In 771 she had her only son, Constantine VI; upon his father's early death in 780 he succeeded to the throne, but under Irene's regency. Their relations went down hill quite soon, probably due to a combination of her intelligence and his evil disposition. In the end, after they began a joint reign in 790, his actions led to a coup by Irene in 797, which resulted in him being blinded so violently that he died a few days later. For the next five years Irene ruled alone, thus allowing Pope Leo III to claim the throne was vacant so that he could proclaim Charlemagne emperor. In 802 Irene was finally deposed in favor of her minister of finance and exiled to Lesbos, where she died the following year.

When Nicephorus I was killed in battle by the Bulgarians he was succeeded by his very badly wounded son Stauracius. He, in turn, was deposed and tonsured in a coup by Michael I, his brother-in-law, and died from his wounds three months later. Michael's reign was not a long one: after also being severely defeated in battle by the Bulgarians he was forced to abdicate and ended up dying as an elderly monk in 840 (Theophylactus was also made a monk and died five years after his father). Their coinage is very rare, almost certainly due in part to the withdrawal of all their issues by their successor.



Michael II Komnenos-[Angelos]-Doukas, was the son of the first Greek ruler of Epiros, Michael I Doukas (1204-1215), himself the illegitimate son of the Sebastocrator John Doukas. After Michael I's death he was succeeded by his brother Theodore (see the preceding lot), who not only managed to capture the new Latin emperor of Constantinople, Peter of Courtenay, in 1217 (he died in captivity two years later, probably poisoned), but after capturing Thessalonica in 1224, was crowned emperor by the Archbishop of Ochrida in 1227. In 1230 Theodore, who was on the brink of taking Constantinople, made the unfortunate decision to attack the Bulgarians, who, under their Tsar Ivan Asen II, heavily defeated Theodore at Klokotnitsa. Theodore's "empire" then collapsed (he was blinded and remained captive in Bulgaria until 1237 when he returned to Thessalonica; when Thessalonica was incorporated into the Empire of Nicaea 1246 he retired to a castle in western Macedonia, but in 1251 the emperor John Vatatzes took him away to Asia Minor, where he died soon after). In any event Michael II, who had been exiled after his father's death, returned to the Epirote capital of Arta in 1230, along with his wife Theodora Petralipha (she later became an Orthodox saint, St. Theodora of Arta; she came from a Norman-Byzantine family descended from Peter d'Aulps, a Provençal nobleman who had accompanied Robert Guiscard to Kephalonia in 1085; after Guiscard's death from a fever in July, Peter became an officer in the forces of Alexius I). By 1246 he had become the effective ruler of Epirus and much of Thessaly, and in c. 1249/1251 he was given the title of Despot by John Vatatzes. After various vicissitudes Michael II managed to form an alliance against the Nicaeans, marrying his daughter Helena to Manfred of Sicily and another, Anna, to Guillaume de Villehardouin, Prince of Achaia: this alliance collapsed in defeat by the Nicaeans at the battle of Pelagonia in 1259. Finally, in 1264, Michael II came to terms with the Byzantine emperor Michael VIII and died, at long last in peace, in c. 1270/1271.

Robert I was the son of the highly unfortunate Peter II, who had become Latin Emperor in 1216, was crowned in Rome in April 1217, but was captured by Theodore Komnenos Doukas of Epirus later that year: he died, probably murdered, in Epirote captivity in 1219. From 1217-1219 the empire was ruled by Peter's wife, the empress Yolanda de Hainault, Marchioness of Namur. At her death in 1219 her second son, Robert, became emperor (her older son, Philip II, Marquis de Namur, refused the throne). Robert was in France when his mother died and only arrived to be crowned in Constantinople in March 1221. Robert's reign was one of decline: Thessalonica fell to the Epirote Theodore Komnenos Doukas in 1224, and in the same year John III Doukas Vatatzes of Nicaea severely defeated Robert at the battle of Poimanenon (near Cyzicus in Mysia), causing the loss of almost all the Latin Empire's Asian territory. Later, in 1227, Robert married a woman known as the Lady of Neuville, who had previously been the fiancée of a Burgundian nobleman. This Burgundian, being rather offended, organized a conspiracy against Robert and his new wife, with the result that the Lady and her mother were seized by some of the Burgundian's friends, who then proceeded to cut off their noses and lips; Robert fled to the Pope. In 1228, on his return journey, he stayed in the Morea with Geoffrey I de Villehardouin, Prince of Achaea, but during his visit he became sick (could it have been malaria?) and died shortly thereafter. This seal, bilingual in Greek and Latin, is a surprisingly elegant memorial of Robert's turbulent and tragic reign.

What is extraordinary about this coin is the cross on its reverse: it has a voided center over a crosslet and with small Latin crosses at each end. This is unusual in itself, but fascinatingly, in a note that appeared in the lamented NCirc in 1994, B. Juel-Jensen and S. Munro-Hay suggested that this Axumite reverse type was actually copied on some later coins of King Offa of Mercia (757-796); in fact, a coin of the present type was actually found by a metal detectorist near Hastings!

The Italian coinage of Zeno was struck in his name by two rulers, one legitimate and the other less so. The earliest issues were produced under Julius Nepos who ruled in the West 474-475 and then was titular emperor, with his court in Dalmatia, 477-480. After 475 almost all coins in the name of Zeno from Italian mints had to have been struck under Odovacar, who had become the de facto ruler of Italy after he deposed Romulus Augustulus and killed his father Orestes. Odovacar ostensibly ruled with the permission of Zeno, but his position was never stable and the Emperor finally sent the Ostrogoths under their king Theodoric to expel him; he was defeated and killed in 493.

In 1986 the Münzsammlung in Munich held a fascinating special exhibition, one of the many that fine museum has had over the years (W. Hess & W. D. Klose, eds., Vom Taler zum Dollar 1486-1986. Munich, 1986): it commemorated the 500th anniversary of the introduction of a large-sized silver coin that became the ancestor of the thousands of thalers, talleros, écus, daalders, 8 reales, crowns and dollars that followed, minted all over the world (the Tirolian Mark standard was, however, changed to the slightly lower weight, and more popular, Cologne Mark). And this coin, officially a Guldengroschen because it was the silver-value equivalent of the Goldgulden, is what started it all. In addition, the design of the coin transports us right back to the late Middle Ages: not only is Sigismund shown in full armor on the obverse, he is shown as charging mounted knight on the reverse. The armor he is wearing is of the later 15th century German High Gothic style: somewhat amazingly enough, the armor he is wearing on the reverse of this coin seems actually to still exist: it was made, c. 1484, in Augsburg by Lorenz Helmschmid and it is now in the "Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna" (KHM) where it is on display!
